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Neurosurgeons Urge Congress to Take Action to Prevent Medicare Cuts Before the End of the Year Absent legislative action, physicians and other health care professionals face cuts of nearly 10% in 2022

Washington, DC—Today, the American Association of Neurological Surgeons (AANS) and the Congress of Neurological Surgeons (CNS) joined leading national health care organizations urging Congress to prevent steep Medicare payment cuts in 2022. Neurosurgical care faces overall payment cuts of nearly 10% at a time when the nation's health care system continues to be stressed by the pandemic. The reductions are partly driven by the expiration of the 3.75% payment adjustment included in last year's Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021. In addition, the moratorium on the 2% Medicare sequestration pay cuts expires at the end of this year, and a 4% Medicare payment cut triggered by the Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010 will also take effect in 2022.

The health care groups' statement reads as follows:

Physicians and other health care providers have taken care of millions of Medicare patients since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and continue to provide world-class patient care. The continuing resolution language released today fails our nation's healthcare heroes by allowing a massive Medicare cut to go into effect. Many in Congress are blaming the other side of the aisle. Our organizations urge Members of Congress to put partisanship aside and work to protect patient access to care. Failure to prevent these cuts will strain our health care system and jeopardize patient access to medically necessary services.

In October, a bipartisan group of 247 lawmakers urged congressional leadership to stop the Medicare cuts before the end of the year. Earlier this week, 271 national and state organizations sent a letter urging congressional leadership to address this important issue before January 1st. The 247 lawmakers and the 271 organizations are working to protect patient access to essential medical care. The continuing resolution language released today ignores this critical need.

Our organizations continue to urge Congress to stop the Medicare cuts from going into effect before the end of the year.

"Millions of seniors rely on the Medicare program, and Congressional leaders must take action before the end of the year to ensure that our patients have timely access to care when they need it most," Dr. Ratliff added.
